#	<i>Sefirah</i>	Focus	Action
1	<i>Keter</i>	Mitzvot	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Observing the 613 mitzvot faithfully, with no loopholes</li> <li>· Encouraging our fellows to do the same</li> <li>· Sharing the 7 Noahide Laws with our Gentile neighbours</li> </ul>
2	<i>Chokhmah</i>	Torah study	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Comprehensive Torah study, covering all aspects (<i>pardes</i>)</li> <li>· Refocus on Tanakh, the Word of God</li> <li>· Infusing traditional Jewish mysticism and philosophy</li> </ul>
3	<i>Binah</i>	Customs	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Recognizing that customs are not the same as God's laws</li> <li>· Eliminating false and pagan customs that have infiltrated Judaism</li> </ul>
4	<i>Chessed</i>	Charity	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Directing our funds to vetted and worthy charities, non-profit organizations, and Torah institutions</li> <li>· Prioritizing the care of widows, orphans, and the impoverished</li> <li>· Not paying exorbitant fees to Torah lecturers</li> </ul>
5	<i>Gevurah</i>	Halakhah	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Returning to authentic Jewish law based on <i>Mishneh Torah</i> and <i>Shulchan Arukh</i>, without excessive stringencies and “fences”</li> <li>· One uniform halakhah for all Jews</li> </ul>
6	<i>Tiferet</i>	Unity	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Repairing relationships – starting with family, and then friends, and community members. Healthy marriages and healthy homes.</li> <li>· Openness to engaging in dialogue with all members of Israel, across the political, religious, and social spectrum.</li> <li>· No more judgement, slander, personal attacks; avoiding division, separation, and sectarianism.</li> </ul>
7	<i>Netzach</i>	Connection	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Directing our prayers only to Hashem</li> <li>· No intermediaries, no intercessors, no saints, no idolizing rabbis</li> <li>· No writing letters to deceased rabbis or praying to deceased rabbis</li> </ul>
8	<i>Hod</i>	Appearance	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Striving to be a “light unto the nations” at all times, to do <i>kiddush Hashem</i>, and represent God gracefully</li> <li>· Appropriate head coverings for both men and women</li> </ul>
9	<i>Yesod</i>	Intimacy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Restoring the traditional family unit with traditional gender roles</li> <li>· Allowing Jewish couples to meet and date organically</li> <li>· Preventing intermarriage and encouraging halakhic conversion</li> </ul>
10	<i>Malkhut</i>	Speech	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>· Speaking Hebrew, the divine tongue (<i>Lashon haKodesh</i>)</li> <li>· Refining our speech and how we speak</li> <li>· Positive, kind, and constructive criticism</li> </ul>
